Vance Wright is a two-spirit textile artist and writer, who was raised on the traditional territories of the S'inixt, Syilx/Okanagan and the K'tunaxa Nations in what is now Nelson, BC. They are of the Dakelh people, hailing from the Tl'azt'en Nation, and are a second generation adoptee raised by a white family. They sit on the Board of Directors at Oxygen Art Centre in Nelson, and are currently pursuing their BFA at Emily Carr University in the Cultural & Critical Practices major. Now living as an uninvited guest on the unceded territories of the Musqueam, Skwxwu7mesh, and the Tsleil-Waututh Nations, Vancouver has been considered home to Vance for the past two years.



Onibana Taiko f / Onibana Taiko

Onibana Taiko is kick ass taiko meets traditional Japanese folk art forms meets feminist queer punk aesthetics. We play taiko (Japanese BIG drums) and combine with our uber tactile and full body resonating beats with the driving sounds of shamisen (Japanese Banjo), amazing and soul piercing traditional Japanese vocals, and the yancha dyke sounds of a fue (a wooden flute). Onibana Taiko invites audience members to commune with our ancestors through Obon dance and music (sort of like a Buddhist Japanese Dia De los Muertos celebration). The group is comprised of Kage (pronounced Kaagay), Noriko Kobayashi and Leslie Komori.

We will present a compilation of varied video performances. We have created all videos recently and specifically for BOA. Some footage was shot with Covid precautions during the pandemic. Some footage is pre-covid including footage from our January 2020 New Year's concert at Moberly Arts and Cultural Centre in Vancouver and various festivals and performances in British Columbia. We hope you will join us to kiai like crazy or yell like a martial artist and dance like a fool to shake off the stress and trauma from those forever seeming Covid lockdown restrictions.

We are multidisciplinary artists who performs the art of Drag. Burlesque gave us the platform and the freedom to express our art and our characters. We are happy to call the Kootenays home now and to feel all the support from our community. For us, Drag is a way to break the gender barrier and be whoever we want to be. We aim to inspire other people to follow their hearts and be their true self. We use pure happiness, fun, sass and dance to share our message. Cause let's be honest, what's life without a little spice!

We are telling the story of two conjoined twins - The Hamilton Sisters - who were famous in the 1950's for their physical appearance in film. When they realize they are no longer happy being conjoined, they dream of the independance of having individual bodies. Our number brings that day dream to life to the song *Woman's World* by Cher. We arrive on stage conjoined by a skirt and once the song transitions to Cher we reveal our black cat suits. There is an element of Yin & Yang with our complimentary black and white accessories. The mood of the number goes from dark to empowering. Our pink umbrellas double as boobs with bedazzled pasties. This community really helped create a platform for The Dancing Legs to flourish & this is our homage to burlesque.
